The City Council convened at 6:30 p.m. on the above date, following a 5:30 p.m. Work Session on the Minnie Street Corridor Study, to conduct a Regular Meeting of the Fairbanks City Council at the City Council Chambers, 800 Cushman Street, Fairbanks, Alaska, with Mayor Jim Matherly presiding and with the following Council Members in attendance:

City Clerk Danyielle Snider read the Mission Statement of the City of Fairbanks.

INVOCATION

The Invocation was given by City Clerk Snider.

FLAG SALUTATION

Mayor Matherly asked everyone to rise and join him in the Flag Salutation.

CITIZENS' COMMENTS

Donna Gardino, P.O. Box 85056, Fairbanks – Ms. Gardino stated she is a board member of the Downtown Association (DTA) and spoke to the different types of roads and traffic patterns in the downtown area. She spoke to the importance of good City streets and street maintenance.

She stated that Public Works needs to be funded to keep the downtown streets, paths, gutters, and parks clean. She spoke to certain areas that could use funding for abatement projects.

Mr. Pruhs and **Ms. Rogers** asked Ms. Gardino to email the information; Ms. Gardino stated she would email the City Clerk the information and request that it be passed on to the City Council.

Chris Miller, 413 Cowles Street, Fairbanks – Mr. Miller stated he agrees with the DTA’s winter strategy and stated that the City needs to figure out how to do more with less. He stated the State Department of Transportation (DOT) is doing a good job at doing more with less.

Mr. Cleworth asked Mr. Miller how many employees the DTA staffs; Mr. Miller stated they staff 0.7 employees.

Ms. Therrien asked Mr. Miller to be more specific with the requests to the City. Mr. Miller stated winter road maintenance needs to be deliberate.

Ms. Kun thanked Mr. Miller for coming to the meeting and asked for an update on donations. Mr. Miller stated there are a few donors each year, but it is never enough sustainable funding.

Ms. Kun asked if there were any new fundraisers coming up; Mr. Miller stated there is only the idea about collaboration with the Mayor’s office for snow removal.

Ms. Rogers stated the DTA and the City have worked in collaboration on many projects over the years. Mr. Miller and Ms. Rogers spoke to the different challenges involved with snow removal in the downtown core area.

Victor Buberger, P.O. Box 58192, Fairbanks – Mr. Buberger stated he has hopes that City snow removal will be swift. He stated unions should not be able to dictate that the City cannot use volunteer firefighters.

Frank Turney, 1434 Lacey Street, #B, Fairbanks – Mr. Turney spoke to the importance of police using less-lethal weapons and asked why nobody is doing anything about racism in the jury pool. Mr. Turney stated that if a radio station is going to give Mayor Matherly and Kathryn Dodge airtime, they should give equal time to Lakesha Jordan and himself as mayoral candidates. He encouraged everyone to vote in the upcoming election and spoke to historically low voter turnout. He stated he does not hate the LGBTQ community, but he supports religious freedom.

Randy Griffin, P.O. Box 73653, Fairbanks – Mr. Griffin stated Fairbanks is in danger of losing freedom depending on how citizens vote in the upcoming election. He stated that if a certain individual is elected as Mayor, Ordinance No. 6093 would become law without a vote of the citizens. He spoke in strong support of allowing the citizens to vote on the issue and pointed out that Anchorage citizens were allowed to vote on a similar issue. He stated a change to the City Seal would be in order if the freedom-robbing ordinance passes, and he displayed a sample of what the City Seal might look like if that happened. The proposed Seal contained a broken heart and read, “Subjugated on December 9, 2019.”

Julie Smyth, 717 9th Avenue, Fairbanks – Ms. Smyth stated she is Inupiaq, and it is something people discriminate against her for. She stated she is also bisexual and, when people find out,

they also may discriminate against her for that. She stated it is not okay for religious people to discriminate based on her being Inupiaq, but for some reason it is okay for them to discriminate against her for being bisexual. She stated it is not something that should go on the ballot. She encouraged voting in the upcoming election and reminded everyone about early voting.

Ms. Kun stated she would like to say happy Bisexuality Day; Ms. Smyth thanked Ms. Kun.

Lakesha Jordan, 505 Stewart, Fairbanks – Ms. Jordan stated that businesses on the outskirts of the downtown area are not as visible during events happening downtown. She suggested that event locations be rotated so that everyone can share in access to those events.

Ms. Rogers asked Ms. Jordan if she had taken her idea to the DTA. Ms. Jordan stated she had not had time to take her idea to the DTA yet.

Hearing no more requests for comment, **Mayor Matherly** declared Citizens' Comments closed.

Mayor Matherly called for objection to APPROVING the Agenda, as Amended, and, hearing none, so ORDERED.

City Clerk Snider read the Consent Agenda, as Amended, into the record.

Mx. Ottersten, seconded by **Ms. Kun**, moved to WAIVE PROTEST on the Marijuana License Applications for Renewal.

Frank Turney – Mr. Turney offered his support for all the license renewals.

Hearing no more requests for comment, **Mayor Matherly** declared Public Testimony closed.

Mayor Matherly asked Clerk Snider to speak to the violations included in the packet in regard to Green Life Supply, LLC. Ms. Snider stated that the Alcohol and Marijuana Control Office (AMCO) has two reported violations, and she pointed out that the owner, Nathan Davis, is present if the Council would like to speak with him.

Nathan Davis, 511 30th Avenue, Fairbanks – Mr. Davis stated one of the violations was a late tax payment, and he did not realize it would result in a violation. He explained that when he was notified, he contacted the State of Alaska and took care of it, but he ran behind the following month. He stated he understood there was a 5% penalty, which he paid. Mr. Davis stated the other violation was in regard to smell; he stated he has purchased a new filtration system, and the problem has been corrected.

Ms. Therrien asked how much the new filtration system cost; Mr. Davis replied that it was more than \$30,000. He stated he has worked as hard as possible to contain the smell.

Ms. Kun asked Mr. Davis when he would be opening an onsite consumption space; Mr. Davis stated he had no intention of doing so.

Mayor Matherly commended Mr. Davis for the investment he made in adding the new filtration system and for caring about the neighbors and neighborhood.

Ms. Rogers thanked Mr. Davis for attending to personally address the concerns raised.

Ms. Therrien shared her concern for the amount of police activity at Northlink and True Dank and asked what the issues were. **Mayor Matherly** stated Police Chief Reeder and Deputy Chief Welborn were not present but that he had spoken with them. He stated the issues were not of concern with the license itself.

Ms. Kun stated the facility is in an area that already had issues, and the license is not the cause.

Mx. Ottersten pointed out that the Northlink callout list is duplicated for True Dank, and there are only 13 total calls.

Mr. Pruhs stated the calls have nothing to do with the license. He stated that the place next door is not the very best housing unit, so calls occurring in the area cannot be helped by the licensee. He spoke about the community service provided by such establishments.

Ms. Kun, seconded by **Mx. Ottersten**, moved to WAIVE PROTEST on the Marijuana License Application for Transfer of Controlling Interest.

Mr. Pruhs stated he finds it reprehensible that the City Council weighs in on this type of transfer and that he does not believe it is the Council's duty to judge the licensee.

Mayor Matherly declared the MOTION CARRIED.

MAYOR'S COMMENTS AND REPORT

Mayor Matherly stated he has many things to report to the Council. He asked his Executive Assistant, Teal Soden, and Helen Renfrew from Explore Fairbanks to come forward.

Ms. Soden spoke to the upcoming Alaska Federation of Natives (AFN) events and to the different entities helping promote the event and gain community involvement. She spoke to

community outreach and promotion of AFN and to the City of Fairbanks and the Fairbanks Police Department's (FPD) involvement in the convention.

Helen Renfrew, Explore Fairbanks – Ms. Renfrew spoke to the upcoming events of the AFN convention and thanked the City of Fairbanks for allowing its staff to participate in various planning roles. She spoke to the various AFN subcommittees and stated they are still recruiting volunteers. She encouraged everyone to sign up and get involved.

Brittany Smart, 907 Terminal Street, Fairbanks – Ms. Smart stated it has been a year since she attended a City Council meeting, and she welcomed new Council members. She spoke to upcoming events the Fairbanks North Star Borough (FNSB) would be involved with. She encouraged everyone to attend Alaska Defense Forum events and encouraged pre-registration.

Mayor Matherly asked Chief of Staff Mike Meeks to speak to the Interior Gas Utility (IGU). Mr. Meeks reported he met with the IGU, and they are installing a few service lines to homes this year and plan for more next year. He reported the City is trying to help by creating permit fee waivers for natural gas hookups.

Mr. Cleworth asked why the IGU has not been providing quarterly updates to the Council; Mr. Meeks stated he would look into the issue.

Mayor Matherly commented on the recent passing of Howard Luke, a respected Native Elder. He stated his painting resides in the hallway at City Hall. **Mayor Matherly** reported there will soon be a non-lethal weapons work session with the City Council and that Police Chief Reeder is working on the presentation. He shared the importance of voting and encouraged everyone to get out and vote early or on election day. He shared that the City has regular meetings with the DTA to discuss snow removal in the City.

COUNCIL MEMBERS' COMMENTS

Ms. Kun stated she had no comments.

Ms. Rogers spoke to the importance of delegates of the Native community coming to Fairbanks for the AFN convention. She stated it is important that the event is well-received so that it can be held in Fairbanks again in future years.

Ms. Therrien stated she is sad to hear that Golden Heart Plaza is not being well-maintained. She stated she would support making sure the downtown area stays clean in the next budget.

Mx. Ottersten stated they share a concern with Golden Heart Plaza. **Mx. Ottersten** shared that Ms. Kun has gone out with her own trash bags and picked up trash in the park.

Mr. Cleworth spoke about the perfect storm that occurred last year with snow removal and stated that equipment failure compounded the issue. He stated that the City is going back to the old way of doing things, and getting behind in the downtown core area never goes well. He stated the downtown area got spoiled when they had the "Clean Team" that took care of graffiti

and other issues. He stated that Festival Fairbanks maintains Golden Heart Plaza, but everyone is likely facing tight budgets.

Public Works Director Jeff Jacobson stated there is a unique problem in the Golden Heart Plaza that is not based upon neglect on anyone's part. He explained that you can clean the plaza one day and come back the next to trash and other unsightly things. He stated it takes a great deal of time and resources to constantly clean up. He stated there was an unusually high amount of graffiti incidents over the summer season, and it takes a lot to stay on top of it every day.

Mr. Cleworth expressed appreciation that every Mayoral candidate is in attendance.

Mayor Matherly stated he met with Julie Jones from Festival Fairbanks, and they are installing security cameras at the Plaza to help to combat some of the issues that have occurred.

Mr. Pruhs suggested that Festival Fairbanks and the DTA combine and seek funding to clean up the downtown area. He commended those who try to keep downtown clean. He commended all the candidates running for office and stated he has not hosted any candidates on his radio show this year. He stated, however, that anyone can call in to his show. He stated he does not like that the City Council discusses stock-only and controlling interest-only license transfers, and he asked the Clerk and Attorney if those types of items could go on the consent agenda.

Ms. Rogers stated it is important to note that the issues in downtown Fairbanks are a symptom of a much larger problem, and there needs to be a greater understanding of the issue. She stated it is not just about trash, but it is about rolling up one's sleeves and working hard on the issues.

Ms. Therrien, seconded by **Mx. Ottersten**, moved to ADVANCE Ordinance No. 6113.

Mr. Cleworth asked for a staff report from Dispatch Manager Kristi Merideth. Ms. Merideth explained that Westnet is the fire alerting system that helps dispatch fire departments to fires. **Mr. Cleworth** stated he understood it was an old system that had been paid for. Ms. Merideth

stated they did not charge yearly maintenance fees in the past, but this year fees have to be paid in order to continue using the software. She explained why the funds are needed and stated that funding will be included in the proposed 2020 budget.

Ms. Therrien asked how many vacancies there are in the Dispatch Department. Ms. Merideth stated the department is two-and-a-half positions short currently.

Fairbanks Diversity Council (FDC) – **Ms. Rogers** stated a quorum has been difficult to establish due to vacancies and asked the Mayor to make some appointments. **Mayor Matherly** stated he is waiting for the Council to decide what to do with the FDC makeup before appointing members, because he does not want to appoint someone only to have to let them go if the FDC shrinks.

She reminded everyone that early voting is open and encouraged everyone to vote.

Ms. Rogers stated she had no comments.

Ms. Therrien offered sympathies to the family of Howard Luke. She thanked her opponent for being a gentleman during the campaign and asked anyone who sees her out holding a sign to wave.

Mx. Ottersten jokingly stated that apathy is the way to go when it comes to voting.

Mr. Cleworth stated he had no comments.

Mr. Pruhs thanked City Engineer Bob Pristash for the Minnie Street Work Session and commended Margarita Bell for a job well done in acting as the Interim Chief Financial Officer.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Fairbanks City Council that the 2020 legislative and capital priorities of the City of Fairbanks are stated in the attached list. In summary, the projects are ranked as follows:

2020 Legislative Priorities

1. Maintain PERS contribution rates
2. Maintain a baseline of \$60 million annually in Community Assistance Program funding
3. Provide for a financial assistance plan to assist municipalities in investigation and cleanup efforts relating to Aqueous Film-Forming Foam (AFFF) contamination
4. Assist with boiler conversions
5. Consider City of Fairbanks' concerns with the new "Tier 5" defined benefit plan being discussed by the legislature

2020 Capital Priorities

1. Fund the Emergency Service Patrol
2. Provide funding for construction of a Law Enforcement Firing Range and Training Facility
3. Provide funding for the replacement of the City Hall heating system

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Clerk is directed to send copies of this resolution to the Office of the Governor and the Interior Alaska Legislative Delegation.

City of Fairbanks Legislative Priorities 2020 FINAL

- 1. PERS Contribution Rate:** The City of Fairbanks supports maintaining the 22% PERS contribution rate as was agreed to by PERS employers and the State in allocating the unfunded liability.
- 2. Community Assistance Program:** The City of Fairbanks is concerned with the yearly reductions in the community assistance program. The City requests that the State funds a baseline floor of \$60 million annually to the program.
- 3. Aqueous Film-Forming Foam Contamination Fund:** The Fairbanks Fire Department and most other firefighting services in the State of Alaska (federal, state, and local) used Aqueous Film-Forming Foam (AFFF) for suppression of petroleum-based fires. Unbeknownst to these agencies, chemicals in the AFFF are harmful to humans. AFFF was used in training exercises at the Fairbanks Regional Fire Training Center (FRFTC) by the Fairbanks Fire Department, State of Alaska agencies, i.e. Fairbanks International Airport, the University, and other firefighting agencies, and has been found in the ground water in and around the FRFTC. The City of Fairbanks is actively assessing and remedying the AFFF contamination from the FRFTC. AFFF contamination is a state-wide problem. The \$9.4M appropriated to DEC to investigate PFAS contamination is a good start, but the State needs to provide funding and assistance to municipalities for these investigations and cleanup efforts, especially when State agencies were responsible for some of the contamination.

The City of Fairbanks requests financial assistance for the City and other Alaskan municipalities which are protecting their residents from the potential health effects of PFC groundwater contamination. To date, the City of Fairbanks has spent over \$4M on remediation – an amount which has been passed along to all property owners within the city limits, including elderly home owners on a fixed income and other low-earning households. These costs are only expected to grow as the groundwater plume continues to spread.

4. **Emergency Service Patrol:** The City of Fairbanks requests \$300,000 for the City's Emergency Service Patrol (ESP). Title 47 (AS 47.37) mandates that persons who are incapacitated by alcohol or drugs must be taken into protective custody by a peace officer or member of an emergency service patrol. The City seeks to continue its ESP for city-wide transport of incapacitated persons. The ESP is the most efficient and cost-effective means of meeting the state-imposed mandates under Title 47. The City police department is currently overworked and understaffed, and given the high call volume created by inebriated individuals, the presence of ESP has taken a substantial workload off of the police officers and paramedics, which allows them to focus on other critical areas of public safety.
5. **Conversion assistance:** With the completion of a 5.2M gallon LNG storage tank in Fairbanks, the local gas utility will be able to start connecting customers who already have a gas distribution system in front of their homes. The City is requesting assistance from the State in finding creative solutions as it pertains to financial assistance for residents converting their boilers from fuel oil to gas. Assistance could come in the form of tax credits, low interest loans, loan guarantees, etc. The push for these conversions should start now, with conversions occurring summer of 2020. The City also requests that the Interior Delegation work with the Congressional Delegation to elicit their assistance with federal resources, specifically EPA funding for clean air initiatives.
6. **Construction of a Law Enforcement Firing Range and Training Facility:** The City of Fairbanks has joined a collaborative regional effort to obtain property and construct a law enforcement firing range and training facility. The only current law enforcement range is located on the Fairbanks International Airport property. Having a shooting range/training facility on airport property has been historically problematic. The current rules surrounding the range make basic training topics and drills difficult and sometimes outright prohibited. Current rules also prohibit law enforcement from bringing citizen groups (such as citizen police academies) to the range during these public training programs. During 2018, areawide law enforcement agencies were notified the firearms training range would be shut down within the next year. There is currently no other firearms training facility within interior Alaska that is capable of functioning as a training range.

A new range facility would be open to and serve every local, state, and federal law enforcement agency within interior Alaska. It would also serve as the primary training site for our interior Alaska police academy. At a time when law enforcement is under constant scrutiny and expected to perform at the highest level of professionalism, a high level of training and a professional training environment is essential. The \$22k appropriations in the FY20 capital budget for the design of this facility is very much appreciated.

- 7. Replacement of the City Hall Heating System:** The current heating system for City Hall is the original steam heating system. This system is well beyond its life cycle and needs replacing. The magnitude of this effort, which will need to be completed within a few short summer months, is projected to cost \$5M because of the asbestos and lead-based paint that most certainly will be encountered. The City requests \$5M from the Capital program to replace the heating system.

- 8. Defined Benefit:** A “Tier 5” defined benefit plan is currently being discussed. The City of Fairbanks is concerned about unfunded liabilities and the exclusive nature regarding which employees receive the benefit. The economic viability of this plan relies on a 7% rate of return on investments. This potential new plan does differ from previous PERS plans with the major differences being: employee contributions are higher, employees must be 55 years old with 20 years of service, the benefit amount is calculated using the employee’s high five years of service instead of high three, and health care is removed from the plan. Defined benefit plans have been cited as an incentive as it pertains to the retention of public safety employees.

WHEREAS, the coins issued under the Native American \$1 Coin Act traditionally have been available only by ordering them from the U.S. mint, which limits availability and does not allow for their use in daily commerce; and

WHEREAS, the resolution by the State House, CS For House Joint Resolution No 9(STA), requests that these coins be made available through normal banking channels throughout the State of Alaska.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Fairbanks City Council supports the Alaska State House Joint Resolution No 9(STA) in celebrating this very important part of Alaska's history and in promoting circulation of the Elizabeth Peratrovich \$1 coin.

The approved reverse design for the 2020 Native American dollar was unveiled Oct. 5 by U.S. Mint Chief Administrative Officer Patrick Hernandez.

The unveiling took place during the Alaska Native Brothers and Alaska Native Sisters Convention at Alaska Pacific University in Anchorage.

The design is dedicated to Elizabeth Peratrovich and Alaska's Anti-Discrimination Law.

The design features a portrait of Peratrovich, whose advocacy was considered a deciding factor in the passage of the

1945 Anti-Discrimination Law in the Alaskan state legislature. The foreground features a symbol of the Tlingit Raven moiety, of which she was a member.

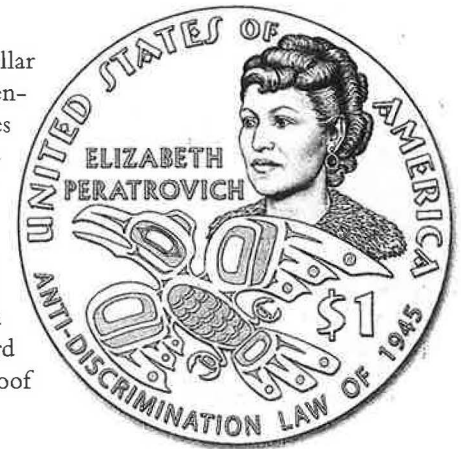
The design was created by U.S. Mint Medallist Artist Phebe Hemphill who will sculpt her own work.

The Native American dollars are produced with an Uncirculated circulation-quality finish and offered in 25-coin rolls, 100-coin bags, and 250-coin boxes of rolled coins each from the Denver

and Philadelphia Mints.

The Native American dollar will also be struck at the Denver and Philadelphia facilities with a special finish for inclusion in the annual Uncirculated Mint set.

The dollar will also be at the San Francisco Mint with standard Proof finish for inclusion in the standard annual Proof and Silver Proof sets and any packaging. ©
